I was 3 lbs when I was born in London Ontario. My Parents brought me home in a shoebox. I grew up in Fredericton, in Nashwaaksis. It was a bit lonely – I'm not one to make too many friends; I stick to a few.

I started working right after high school - been doing janitorial since 89. I knew Mum and Dad weren't going to be around forever, so I said to myself, I said: Maybe it's time to step up. I want to be independent. My neighbor did some calling around. I spoke to the woman at Literacy NB. She said, "You sound very, very strong."

I was only 42 when I first came in. Seven years ago. People learn at their own speed, so I decided to take a break. But this past July, I decided I was ready to come back. I wanted to keep learning.

We met at the the Oromocto Library. I've worked with Ricky. She used to be a teacher. She doesn't listen to "I can't"! She'll give me homework and I'll go further - not too far beyond; just a couple of pages. I'm crazy over math - Love math!

What has changed? I'll try to figure out whatever I don't know. I like to challenge myself with big words now. I'll pick up the newspapers on Thursdays at work. One time there was an article about my friend's daughter and I found it in the paper! I brought it to her and her daughter hanged it on her wall. She's always reading it.

I still have difficulty when I fill things out sometimes. I have to read the chemicals at work. I passed the safety test - I was right proud of myself! Only made 3 mistakes in the whole test!

I have so many goals. I want to get my driver's license. I want to become a tutor. I want to work with children - maybe read to them as a volunteer.

I know what it's like to struggle. But I also know you can do it.

What's my motto? Don't give in; don't give up."

New Brunswick Women's Correctional Centre

Who dreams of growing up and ending up in jail? I believe no one ever dreams of that reality, but in this reality called my life, I AM incarcerated. I never imagined that I would ever end up in this type of situation, but, since I am, I had to believe that I could NOT just sit back and let life pass me by. Instead, I was proactive and requested to attend the General Educational Development (GED) class at the institution. I already had my high school diploma so, originally, I attended the classes to help pass my time in jail, but, once I started to complete the curriculums in Mathematics and Language Writing, I came to realize that I was very strong in school.

When further encouragement from my support systems poured in, I decided that I would seek out any possibilities that I could to broaden my education, for example post-secondary courses. After a long battle with the management of the institution, the assistance from the teachers and a couple of correctional officers, plus the persistence I had, it all paid off and I was granted the privilege to continue post-secondary education through a distance education program provided by a west coast university. The courses I am currently taking are electives that fall under the Bachelor of Business program.

In my previous life (before my incarceration), I was technically a registered massage therapist in New Brunswick, and, since I was a self-employed therapist, I believed that taking business classes would only help make my own endeavours more successful. Unfortunately, with how my current dilemma is unfolding, there is a possibility that I may not be able to continue my practice, so the question regarding my current situation became, "What will I do for work if I cannot return to massage therapy when I finally get out?"

At forty-one years old, I had to revisit the same choices I had over twenty years ago in my last years of high school: the hardship of deciding what career path I desired and how I was going to pursue it. The decision was not easy because, to pursue another career path in what I believed to be at an old age, was a dilemma I never figured I would have to overcome. Nonetheless, one of my GED teachers, Mr. Bob Gillis, opened my eyes to many possibilities that I am able to follow. He made me believe that, no matter the age or situation one was in, if they truly wanted to succeed in their goals and were willing to work hard for it, everything was possible.

In class, we were introduced to a guest speaker from the New Brunswick Apprenticeship and Occupation Program who spoke to us about the opportunities there are for work and furthering our education into a field that not many women are in.

Through apprenticeships, you alternate between working in the field of choice and being paid to learn your trade. The guest speaker, Mr. Wade Wheaton, explained the importance of GED in helping prepare you in the path to an apprenticeship. The GED class was also the outlet for more information on how I could pursue this new goal. I had decided on a new career as an electrician. As a female future electrician in New Brunswick, I also hope to be a great role model for other women to pursue a career in a male-dominated field so that we can prove to the world that we are no longer considered a weaker sex in this industry.

In closing, returning to learning has positively changed my life forever. "What we do today, right now, will have an accumulated effect on all our tomorrows," was stated by Ann Frank. I truly believe that learning has led me to bigger dreams and goals. It has given me a great foundation to pursue further education and choose a new profession. As an electrician, I am required to be strong in mathematics, and my GED class has helped me sharpen those skills. It has also been a guide to the next path I must take to fulfil my career goals. The teachers provide us with more information and connect us with the proper resources. They also showed me the doors in life that I did not know were opened for me. As unfortunate as my situation has been, I believe that when one door seems to be closing, not only one but another four open. These opened doors led me to this great new journey.

As S. Devi used to say, "Education is not just about going to school and getting a degree, it is about widening your knowledge and absorbing the truth about life." The world is a big classroom and I believe that learning is a lifelong process that transcends beyond getting a diploma or degree. Every experience or challenges we encountered in life gives us a lesson or two. There is no such thing as "too late or too early" when it comes to education or learning. It is always possible to achieve something in life despite of many challenges you might have or had: age, family situation, learning disability, social anxiety and economic status. As long as you are open to embrace change and ready to conquer your fears; the whole new door of opportunities will be opened for you.

First, I'm going to tell you about why I decided to return to learning. I'm 28 years old without a full education on my record and with a 5-year-old who just recently started school himself. I left school when I was in Grade 10 because of bullying and the major stress I was under with home life. School for me was extremely difficult especially being diagnosed with ADHID. Furthermore, I was also diagnosed with dyscalculia when I was 24 and that made it a bit harder on me because if I would have known I had that disorder whilst in high school I would have received special accommodation to help me with my Math. Few years after I left school, I had my son who is my biggest inspiration on why I wanted to complete my education. I would like to be able to get somewhere so I can show him and everyone else that no matter how old you are, you can still make a difference in your life and can still have a good future even when things may seem impossible.

I have been struggling to keep up with everyday life no matter what I tried. I was generally just tired of dead-end jobs and not being able to get anywhere for years because I didn't have a diploma to even get a good paying job. I have been on social assistance for many years and was always thinking because of my age that at this point it was hopeless to think that I could have a future and a career this late in my life. My case worker told me about the classes for adults that help you get back into learning and achieving the goals you want. They provide funding which includes transportation, daycare and after school programs for kids and help make a schedule that best suits you. I decided that it was high time I kick started my future and picked up my phone and got the information I needed to get started as soon as I could, so that I'm able to get a good career that I enjoy doing so I can better my life not only for me but for my son as well.

Going back to school as an adult changed my life in so many different ways. I used to be very anti-social especially with people I didn't know. I didn't care for meeting new

people as I was much more comfortable with the friends I already knew. When I first found out I was going to be starting school I was so excited that I was finally going to be able to get my education. But when the start date in class was approaching. I began to get extremely nervous that my anxiety started to kick into overdrive and just immediately started throwing excuses at myself as to why I shouldn't go. I was in a panic mode again that I won't be able to make it, since, 3 years prior I had tried already to go back to school and it wasn't successful because of certain things that were going on in my life at the time. Finally, the day came for the first day of classes. I woke up got myself and my son ready, brought him to the bus and once he was on his way to school it was my turn. When I arrived in class there were few people already there, faces I have never seen before and a completely new environment that I was accustomed to at all. I got myself settled into my seat and pretty much just kept to myself for most of the day, that is until two of my classmates decided to talk to me. I was generally surprised as I really didn't think anybody was going to, I thought it was going to be high school all over again. We ended up hitting it off pretty well, found out a lot of things about each other and we had a lot more in common than I anticipated.

As for my teacher, well that's another story. I have never had such an amazing teacher, I mean compared to high school she made our class feel like home. She is always cheerful and makes you feel like you could do anything you set your mind to. And guess what, her upbeat attitude and her belief in me helped me realized in the long run that I was capable of doing so much more than I thought I could. In class, I am comfortable working at my own pace and my teacher is always available for me whenever I need help. Everybody is very understanding and I never felt judged about my education level, lifestyle or anything. They always find a way to help you out no matter what it's about, its almost like I found myself a second family. It so much more relaxing than high school ever was. I think that was one of my biggest fears was that things were going to be like it was for me in high school, but boy was I ever wrong! This has been the best experience I ever had and best decision I ever made for myself. All my insecurities are gone and I feel like a completely new person, in a good way of course. My classmates and my teacher have made my time here extraordinary, indeed. So not only am I getting my education, I have made a few new friends and an entirely new positive attitude.

I have a few goals for my future once I finish my upgrading and complete my GED. I plan to take Auto Body Repair course at the college. Not many people would think of this profession suitable for women and not many would go for that type of work, but like I always told myself, there's nothing wrong with being different. My gender will not define my career choices, I believe that I can achieve anything if I put my time, my heart and effort into it. So, once I graduate from college, I am planning on working with my dad in his garage that he owns on his property and eventually I'm hoping to take over the

business once he retires, to keep the legacy going sort of speak. Finally, someday in the future I'm going to buy myself a nice house where I could raise my son in.

In conclusion, learning changes lives in so many ways. It will open doors of opportunities in the future, you will get to understand your own strengths and weaknesses as a learner, it will help you build new friendships and help you foster positive attitude towards life. Never think that it is too late to get your education, whether you quit school in your younger years, never went, or for any reason you might have had to stop. There is always support and help available through social services, employment agencies, local community and of course, your family. All you have to do is to recognize you need help, reach out and have a strong will that you want to achieve something greater in life. There is always a reason if you search inside yourself to go back and get it done. My greatest "why" is my son, because I want to make a good example for him. I want to show him that education is the best thing he can have in his life and that no matter what obstacles may land in his way that he can do anything he puts his mind to. Never forget your worth because you can make your dreams come true if you truly want them because if you can dream it you can achieve it.

By the time I was 17, I had changed schools 10 times and lived in six different cities. The novelty of being the new kid was long gone, so I started doing everything I could to stay home from school. The more time I missed, the more anxious I felt going back.

My life turned into a constant battle of avoidance, falling behind and being lost. I sank deep into an anxiety disorder. Asking for help seemed impossible and education became increasingly meaningless. Eventually, all my willpower to finish school fizzled out and I left high school in 2013 without any credits.

I was angry with myself. I watched my peers working and graduating, things that seemed so normal to everyone else. I thought, *this is not the life I should have had.*

At 19, I was broke, young and without an education. I was living back in my hometown of Saint John where I leapt at the offer of a full-time cleaning job. For the next three years, I thought of the life I should have had while scrubbing room-sized shower stalls in big, beautiful homes.

Everything changed this past summer when I was laid off, but I felt more relief than heartbreak and took it as an opportunity to seek out The Learning Exchange in January of 2019.

At 23-years-old, I jumped full-time into the Community Adult Learning Program to study for the GED tests. I had fantasies of what I wanted to do with my life but had been too scared to consider them a real possibility.

I felt included almost immediately. Hearing bits of my classmate's life stories, while each unique, helped me realize I am not so different than everyone else.

My journey here as a learner has become so much more than just getting my GED. I find myself curious at the mention of a presentation or a new program, instead of instinctively shying away.

I've attended every weekly guest presentation and joined in the Money Matters course. The people who work here contribute to an environment that breeds learning at its core. In class with facilitator Dale Kilpatrick, a comment about the weather could lead to an interactive lesson on meteorology, or a tip on accurate news sources. I'm learning things about myself and my capabilities every day – and it's exciting.

In a little over two months, I've written and passed two of the GED tests. With help from coaches, I've also obtained my learner's drivers licence and applied to the New Brunswick College of Craft and Design. I was ecstatic when I received an

acceptance letter into the Foundation Visual Arts program for the 2019-2020 academic term, on the conditional basis of receiving my GED certificate.

Learning as an adult has a new, multi-faceted meaning. I know now there is power in education, and how social studies, science, math, reading and writing weave its way into our everyday adult lives. Since returning to learning, my future is almost tangible.

The life I should have had will be whatever I want it to be.

I do not remember anytime where either of my parents was involved with my schooling; never was I asked if homework was done, or how I was doing in school. When the bad grades came in, I was sure to hear how I need to try harder and improve. The funny thing about it all was not a soul was helping me. When I was in grade ten, I took up the love of Rugby. I enjoyed every minute of being on that felid. You felt so free, and also it being an aggressive sport, you could blow off some steam without getting in trouble.

When I went into grade eleven, I was not doing so well with my grades. In this year the school really cracked down. If you were not doing well with school, no sports! What was I going to do? I can tell you that I didn't choose the right answer. I become angry and upset. How was I going to do that all on my own? I was sixteen, and I never believed in myself like I do now, and at the time felt I was just going to lose no matter what. I had a steady boyfriend, and like all other girls at that age, he was my world. As long as I had him I thought I was okay. Being in high school, you think you're in love, and they are your world. Well my world cheated on me. The next steps to follow would end my high school education. Like all drama filled teen aged girls, I blamed everyone who did not need to be blamed for his actions. I ended up having a physical altercation with the girl at school. I was suspended without a chance of going back. All of a sudden that adult life I was so eager to live was mine. I had to get a job. Well if I could step back in that clock, the only one getting a butt whooping would be ME!

I got pregnant with my daughter at nineteen. After I had her, I thought I could attempt to do my GED. Turns out when you have a new baby at home, and your running your house hold, there is no time to give yourself to work on the curriculum required to pass the test. I was living with my daughter's father at the time. He worked all day and at night I felt like I had two kids. That attempt at my GED was a failure again. I had no one but myself to blame for not standing up and asking for the help I

needed to succeed. When my daughter was eight months old, my relationship with her father deteriorated, and I packed our life up and returned to Millville where I would have the help from my family. I was only there a few short months when my maternity funding had run out; I was devastated. What was I going to do to provide for this child? My step mother had broken the reality to me that I would have to go on income assistance. My Pride and self-esteem went out the door that day; all I could think about is the bad stigma attached to being a "Welfare bum". All the while my parents reassuring me that it was temporary, and that I could not be too proud to feed my child. While being on income assistance, I found anyway to get off it. One afternoon I was searching schools that took mature students with no High school requirements. I came upon and Hair and Esthetics school where I would apply and later begin a Beautician Career. I was hired by my school to work as a part time stylist, while taking my esthetics course. I loved everything about making people leave feeling like a million dollars, I might not be having the best day but in some way I touched theirs. It still was not enough; I left the school for what I thought would be benefiting my daughter by me being close to home. She was starting preschool and being the proactive parent I wanted to be in close ranged if she needed me. it turns out that the shop I worked in was new, and with a new shop comes down falls such as building the most important part the clientele. In city's you have more of a population so many different services are preformed, not just cuts. It would turn out that I was not making ends meet with this job. I would have to pick up another one where I did bereavement for foster care. There was something still not making me happy, work followed me everywhere I went. I needed a job where I could go and come home shut the door and enjoy my daughter, not have fifty messages for a haircut at my house- not the shop. My friend was the manager of the Deli at Sobeys; at the time she was looking for someone. That person would be me!

I have always had a good work ethic I take what I do to heart, I learn quick, hands on, and in fast pace environment. I did not just not stay in that one department, I learned in different departments. My store manager would see my achievements, and push me to the next goal to advance in my career. When it came time to choose a manager for the department, it would happen to be it just was not my turn. It was at that moment I realized I worked hard to be in that line and did not get the golden ticket. If I could work that hard for a company with an unknown future why could I not apply that energy in to myself? It took one phone call to get the ball was rolling; all of a sudden I was going to school to get my GED, leaving my job; so many scary things all at once. In September of 2017 I started my journey with great success. I passed 4/5 courses. Math would appear to want to challenge me. I tried everything I could think of to help myself; I ended up calling my councillor, to see how she could help me. I was referred back to classes for math. I am thankful that Joanne McIsaac took the time to access my math skills. She has held me accountable for the questions I do not know; she explains clearly why it is right or wrong. She takes the necessary measures to make sure her

students are succeeding and not just letting them hurry through it to get it done. I am confidant with her help I will become a successful High School Graduate. Even at the age of 32 it excites me to think I will graduate, I think more because my daughter will be watching me; also I will be throwing a big bag of rocks off my back when I become successful.

Never give up on yourself; you are the only thing stopping yourself. Its more than piece of paper, it's like a key to a door you have not been able to open and now you're so close to the possibilities behind it are endless. Lynne, Kim and myself got lost in River du Luc, Quebec trying to get out of the thunder and lightning storm. Looking for barns or anything. Finally this gentleman picked us up and took us for supper. We hadn't eaten in 2 days. He got us a cabin and then talked us into going back home to the child's father whether I liked it or not. I was embarrassed but we gave it a whirl.

Number 2 child is born in 1982, I was running again so I gave him up for adoption. I was leaving town to Moncton, NB. It was one of the hardest things I ever did but at the time I felt it was right. Running with 2 children was just too hard. I was trying to get my hairdressing in Moncton. I was always learning and working and trying to raise my daughter the best I could. Moncton wasn't much easier. I was involved in two fires but I stuck it out as long as I could but then I could no longer stand it and had to go home.

Dad picked me up at the bus stop in Saint John with nothing but my bag, my daughter and a guitar. It was heartbreaking for him. I lived with my mom and dad for quite a few years after that. Only to get back out on with my own life going good, my ex-boyfriend Jack from age 14 popped back into my life. What a trip that was! One day we were out moose-sighting, we didn't see any moose, we scared them away, and we rocked the van! I got pregnant! I had to go back him. I was bedridden in hospital with toxemic poisoning. I was in labour all night and they thought it was pressure. The next morning I got up to use the bathroom and there was blood everywhere. I blew limbs up like tree trunks. They had to take tow beds, put a slab of plywood over it. I was in the dark, alone, scared with no visitors. I thought I was a goner. Well, 3 transfusions and I lived through it. I was so sick though. Well life goes on—new chapter.

Ashley was born in 1999—little angel she was but her father controlled me because I was too sick and he took advantage of the situation. I felt trapped and left once I felt better. I called Social Development for help and they took custody of Ashley and I lived in hiding for months so her father couldn't find me. Ashley has transitioned since then into Parker. We reunited and now I am living a dream come true. He, his sister Lisa, and my two grandchildren spend time together and love each other every chance we can.

Not knowing the right direction to turn when you are lost and alone and afraid you trust the wrong people. At the time you are in need and will grab anything and anyone who can help. Through the years I have met lots of people that I can also trust. At that time I was just reaching out for anyone. Once I looked at myself and got help, I was encouraged to keep going through different programs. I got on the right track in life and I have never given up.

Today, I am loved and I have wonderful people in my life. I have learned right from wrong, negative against positive choices through teachers, coaches and teamwork in school. These things give me the strength to keep going—to never quit. Since 2006 to present I'm always learning as I go through life's journey of ups and downs. Finding yourself and who you are is surprising. The outcome is shocking.

Furthermore, I knew I would have to be dedicated in order to be successful. I needed to have perfect attendance, be attentive inside the classroom, do all homework and receive at least eight hours of rest per night.

I have some obstacles in my way, such as extremely poor eyesight, ADHD and a learning disorder. Nonetheless, I did not let that deter me; I attend school regularly, keep a positive attitude, (even though at times I have wanted to give up), do all assignments and do my best. I can now study proudly and with the utmost confidence in my achievements. I am scheduled to write four of the GED exams in April, and I believe I will be on the way to achieving my high school equivalency. Even if I fail all the tests, I will try again. When I succeed in obtaining my GED, my next step is to gain acceptance at a trade school and become a plumber. Then I can look back and feel proud of myself for changing my life and the lives of my sons.

In conclusion, I suggest to all you adults who are serious about your educational goals and possess the qualities I have previously mentioned, that you need to obtain your GED.
